THE MISSION OF STE. ELIZABETH

In Washago

In the year 1643 The Iroquois expansion was pushing many groups of Algonquin's west into Huron territory. With winter fast approaching one of these groups arrived near the village of St. Jean Baptiste (somewhere near Bass Lake in Oro-Medonte Township). From there they were accompanied by Father Jerome Lalemant (who had been with the Huron since 1638) to the Mission of Ste. Elizabeth.

The Mission of Ste. Elizabeth was established sometime around 1640 and its location is said to be at the north end of

Lake Couchiching, two to three miles south of the district of Muskoka. The mission was at this time under the care of Father Rene Menard who had previously worked at the Mission of the Holy Ghost (established in 1641 by Father Claude Pijart).

Menard had arrived in Canada in 1640 and remained at the Mission of Ste. Elizabeth until the Huron culture was nearly wiped out in 1649. It is assumed that the mission was destroyed at this time as well because Menard then went on to live among the Iroquois around Lake Superior.

JUST-A MERE-WALK IN WASHAGO




Exercising seems to be a way of life these days. It seems like somehow everyone is getting involved. By far, simply walking is the easiest, cheapest and most popular form of exercising one could engage in. The reasons are very obvious. You can walk anytime, day or night, you can walk almost anywhere, you can walk at any pace you choose and wear almost any type of clothing you prefer. During the cold season you can dress warm and during the warm season you can dress accordingly, and if it's raining you can snuggle under an umbrella and keep going. There are no registration fees, no dues and no charges, just your willingness to participate. These are certainly the most common reasons for walking, but let's delve just a little deeper into other reasons people are hitting the side-walks, hiking trails and road-ways. In the Village of Washago I have had the opportunity to talk with many walkers and pass the time of day with them. No I'm not a walker, but I enjoy every minute spent speaking with those doing so. Some are my neighbors, others are my friends and still others are total strangers inquiring of directions, local interests and historical information.

They seem to come from all over. Last week-end, I met some folks from Etobicoke that just parked their car and asked if I knew of a good area to start their walk. Because my home is located near Washago, on a small island with-in an even larger island, I was able to direct them to many dead-end roads with very little

traffic. With-in five miles of the Village there are ELEVEN road bridges along with many rail-road bridges. Although we do not suggest anyone should walk along the rail bridges, I only mention this to indicate the amount of water surrounding the Washago area. The walkers are never very far away from enjoying the various historical water routes. Lake Couchiching, the Severn River, the Black, and Green are all very much in reach for any caliber of walker. Many folks like my neighbors, Nancy Morrison and her friend Betty Erickson, (both retired), walk for exercise and companionship. Although neither one needs to lose weight, they have found the exercise so relaxing, they have made it a way of life and have been walking for many years. Nancy suggested the two of them walk approximately eight kilometers a day, WOW, that's commitment, I see them every morning on my way to work and what a pleasure it is, to stop for a moment and pass the time of day with them. They are always smiling, happy, upbeat and so friendly. Betty confides that the two of them often change their routes to keep the scenery fresh in their minds. Then there's Ken and Stella Schanck, also neighbors, walking with their dog Sheba, forever training the young German Sheppard. Trish and Derek Mader along with sixteen month old J.R. (real name Jacob Ross walk constantly. Day in and day out, the dedicated walkers continue, and the reasons are as varied as the people themselves.

While walking, the use of a walking stick can come in handy for many reasons. Certainly the obvious, would be to ward off any stray dogs you may not be familiar with, but also for balance purposes. Walking allows one to get as close to nature as possible, because of the absence of noise. Enjoying the wild-life in the country is perhaps the most enjoyable benefit of walking. Can you imagine the opportunity to listen to the various birds, watching fish swim, seeing deer jump, and other animals in the wild, on your walk? Witness the spring flowers sprouting up, the wild trilliums, daffodils and early tulips and then watch your neighbors gardens come to life as you pass by each day. Comments from various people I have spoken with, confirm they have seen deer, moose, rabbits, fox, geese, ducks, birds galore, muskrat, beaver, various fish life and very unusual people. Walking can be so exhilarating and certainly the Village of Washago offers so many opportunities to enjoy the exercise and enjoy nature at the same time. I'd like to say, see you on the trails, but chances are I wont. Keep up the good work, and welcome to the world of walking. Next week let's get out on the river and visit with some folks canoeing and kavaking as they paddle along the beautiful Severn River.



Identity Theft - Part 2

Financial Identity. We are all concerned with our pocketbook, unfortunately so are some others, looking to get more out of that wallet or purse than what's in there, and surprisingly it's easier than you think. Take for example a check you put in the mail. I remember when I was in my early teens my dad bought a 'Checkwriter' for his business. You think a sealed envelope is safe? I watched as the man from the 'Checkwriter' company removed a check from a sealed envelope without opening or steaming the seal then lifted the signature off the check then put the check back in the envelope in less than thirty seconds with no evidence of tampering! Easy with the right tools and knowhow. Ahead thirty or forty years to electronic commerce of today, and believe me every transaction whether you like it or not is electronic, even hand written checks are now electronic. I don't have the space here to explain how that works. So here are things you should always do: 1)keep your cards in your possession at all times when making purchases and if the terminal has to be swiped by the attendant keep your eye on that card. With the technologies of today it is very easy to capture your information, 2)always remove mail in your mailbox as soon as possible, pre-approved credit cards are a favourite of thieves, they take your mail and send it in with their address and obtain access to your credit while leaving you to pay the bill, 3)always retain your right to privacy and do not give out personal information over the phone or elsewhere unless you initiated the call and then never give out your S.I.N. number unless you are talking with Canada Revenue Agency or Employment Insurance, no other organization needs your S.I.N. number. Also ask how the information will be used. 4)Never carry your S.I.N. number or other forms of identification unless absolutely necessary, I.E. when

driving you need to carry your drivers licence. 5)use passwords on your accounts and cards that are not easily guessed such as maiden names, phone numbers or portion thereof, birth dates, etc. as all of these are easy to obtain so come up with passwords that are easy for you to remember but very difficult for others to figure out and KEEP IT TO YOURSELF. 6)know your billing cycles and should a bill come late or not at all then call the company and find out why. Thieves that intercept mail can use that information or use your account to gain credit fraudulently. If you move or are away for any length of time, have your mail stopped or rerouted. 7) obtain your credit report on a consistent basis (quarterly) to know where you are at and find out if someone is using or has used your financial identity. I personally know a gentleman in Barrie that owns his own business and house that they have lived in for twenty years and when he received his credit report found out he had another house in Kitchener in his name. Fortunately he had 'Identity Theft Shield' to protect him and restore his identity and clean up the mess the thieves made of his good name and credit. 8)be sure to have some form of 'Identity Theft' protection on you and your family from a reputable company.

Financial Identity Theft is only a part of the problem, in fact only 28% of all 'Identity Theft' is financial. Next time a round we will explore your Health Identity. Happy New Year.

Spam Filters

Yahoo/Rogers --- Set up the junk e-mail filter

The most effective way to prevent spam from entering your inbox is to use SpamGuard. Help increase SpamGuard's effectiveness by sending examples of spam to Yahoo! to review. Yahoo! will use the messages you send using the "Spam" button to constantly improve the SpamGuard technology.

You can choose how long you want to keep messages in your Bulk Mail Folder. You can choose to drop all messages in your Bulk Mail Folder or keep messages for 1 week, 2 weeks or 1 month. The default is one month. To edit the SpamGuard feature:

Click "Mail Options"

Click "Spam Protection"

Here you will have the following two choices:

"Immediately delete these messages upon receipt".

"Save these messages in the Bulk folder".

Select the desired timeframe from the drop down menu.

Important: Occasionally, valid email messages may be perceived as spam and delivered to the Bulk folder. Please note that if you select this option, you will not have an opportunity to review the messages in your Bulk folder before they are deleted.

Click "Save Changes"

Hotmail --- Set up the junk e-mail filter

The junk e-mail filter helps keep unsolicited messages out of your Inbox. You can specify how restrictive you want the filter to be.

Click **Options**.

On the left side of the page, click Mail.

Click Junk E-Mail Protection, and then click Junk E-Mail Filter.

Click a filter level (Low, Enhanced, or Exclusive).

If you choose the Exclusive level for your junk e-mail filter, make sure that your Contacts list includes all of the e-mail addresses that you want to receive messages from, including your own. Otherwise, messages from those e-mail addresses are automatically sent to the Junk E-Mail folder.

Click **OK.** Note It's a good idea to check your Junk E-Mail folder frequently to ensure that important mail isn't being filtered as junk. If you find a message that you don't consider junk, select the check box next to the message, and then click **Not Junk** on the toolbar. *Tips Submitted by:*

TAXES MADE EASIER

Ontario businesses are one step closer to millions in savings with the introduction today of legislation that would designate a single corporate tax collector for the province.

"Corporate tax consolidation is a big win for the Ontario Chamber of Commerce and an even bigger win for Ontario businesses," says Len Crispino, President and CEO of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce. "We estimate that this streamlining will save Ontario businesses \$100 to \$150 million each year in time and money, creating room for more investment in the things that will make our economy grow - like human capital, new equipment and research and development."

The legislation, introduced by Ontario Finance Minister Greg Sorbara, follows from a Memorandum of Understanding signed with Federal Minister of Finance Jim Flaherty in October. It will transfer the collection and administration of Ontario's corporate income tax to the federal government. Under the agreement, businesses would make combined payments starting in 2008 and file a single return beginning in 2009 for taxation years ending after December 31, 2008.

"We have long called for one tax return, one set of rules and one point of contact," explains Crispino. "The single tax collector will mean savings and efficiencies for businesses and government, and ultimately make our province more competitive."

This legislation will reduce compliance costs for businesses and enable the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) to streamline service and reduce administrative costs. Benefits to Ontario businesses will include:

- A single tax form.
- A single tax collector. The CRA will collect federal and Ontario corporate income tax and administer the province's capital tax.
- One set of income tax rules.

The federal government already collects corporate income tax for seven provinces and three territories.

Recipe

Yummy tea biscuits:

3 cups flour

3 tbsp. butter

1 tsp. Salt

1 tbsp. Baking powder

1/3 cup sugar

3 tbsp. butter

1 egg

1 cup milk

Mix flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Cut in butter with pastry cutter. Beat egg and milk together and add to flour mixture. Pat to 1 inch thick and cut into rounds. Bake at 400* for approximately 10 minutes until golden.




