
The Saga Lives On

To continue on from the end of council representative Colon Couper's letter in our last issue, not much has changed as far as the commitment stage is concerned toward the decision of a dead or alive community center. However the engineer's plans have been submitted to council for consideration toward the repair and renovation of our existing building, so hopefully that's a good sign that things are still in the process of getting done. According to the plans, I'm told there will have to be some fairly major repairs done to the existing structure including the demolition of the kitchen area due to foundation problems, a total new and probably sloped roof with the removal of the mould problem, an addition on the back corner by the washrooms to be used for a skating change room, the front door moved to the back for easy access to and from the parking lot, opening the front gates to Hwy 169 and erecting signage on the main street through town. No second floor is planned at this time but that may change as of the meeting at the center held on Thursday March 30, 2006, when all of the council representatives were present to look over the engineer's suggested plans, discuss the recommendations and suggest alternatives that may help keep the costs down and allow the repairs to get under way as soon as possible. After the meeting was over, the engineers were asked to take the plans back and make some alterations to them, then resubmit them for council to again consider.

A one or two week time frame was expressed as necessary to complete the changes of the plans, so at this point it looks like council will be again debating the possibilities of the dead or alive community center (presently dead) in early May. At that time, hopefully a commitment to giving Washago back the communities heart beat will be given, and the fund raising can begin. It will not be an easy venture to get this done, but if we all pull together and make this a project for the betterment of our local residents and groups, I'm sure at the end of it all we will all hold our heads up high and be proud of what has begun again here in our BOOMING metropolis of Washago.

Turtle Run

One day last fall, Marianne received a call from the Muskoka Wildlife Centre on Highway 11, where she had put her name on their list of potential volunteers. They had a turtle in trauma and asked if we would drive it to the Turtle Trauma Centre. We had not heard of the Turtle Trauma Centre, so were told that it is located in the Riverview Zoo in Peterborough. Its mandate is "to treat injured native turtles" in order to "preserve a vital component of our wetlands." Their literature states that "turtle populations in Ontario are rapidly declining. … Experts predict that unless efforts are taken to protect native turtles, some species will cease to exist in Ontario." Thus the urgency to get this sick turtle to the turtle emergency department fast.

Marianne's main concern was the fact that we no longer had the van, only the car and, even though we could move the front seats forward, she didn't know whether there was enough room in the back seat for a traumatized turtle. We've seen large turtles while out walking, and huge snapping turtles in the wild, and wondered what kind of restraints they had for the turtle to protect the upholstery and, indeed, the occupants of the car. So she asked, "How large is the turtle?" "About the size of a toonie", was the reply.

So we headed up to the Wildlife Centre to pick up the turtle. They were expecting us. The turtle, a Painted Turtle (the kind you buy in pet stores next to the goldfish), showed all the signs of trauma- a soft shell curled up at the edges and a growth on its snout. So the turtle was placed into his aerated clear plastic container which was then placed into the emergency carrier (one labeled 'Coleman'). We were on a mission with not a minute to lose.

The two hour trip was hurried but otherwise uneventful. Again, they were waiting for us when we arrived. "You're the folks with the turtle from the Muskoka Wildlife Centre? We've called in the specialist and he'll be here at 6 o'clock to begin treatment."

We learned that the Turtle Trauma Centre has treated traumatized turtles from as far away as New Brunswick. They are very professional and dedicated to the preservation of turtles.

Having achieved our objective, we were able to take a few moments to meander through the Zoo. The Zoo is first rate, located on the banks of the Otonobee River, high enough to avoid being flooded, and well worth a visit. After making the acquaintance of a couple of Camels, we were soon on our way back to Washago.

Postscript: About a month or so later, we read the Front Page Headline in the Orillia Today: "No last-minute reprieve for 'real classroom". As background, Orillia was given a parcel of contaminated land from Molson's on the condition that Molson could wash their hands of the problem, and they are now in the process of developing it for a Multi-Use Recreational Facility (MURF). The contaminated soil is being removed and trucked to the landfill site located on the shores of Lake Simcoe. A wetland is also situated on the MURF site which "harbors a variety of wildlife" including ducks, Great Blue Herons, frogs, turtles and so on. The newspaper article goes on to say, "the wetland (is) slated to be covered over as part of the site's preparation, ... smothering the gentle creatures in a mountain of fill".

Maybe the turtle we rescued will end up in a museum, right next to the last Passenger Pigeon. Craig Welbourn




Take a walk on the wild side

Habitat Speaks to Washago Rotarians

Habitat for Humanity is an International, nonprofit, nondenominational Christian housing ministry. Habilat welcomes all people-regardless of race, religion, ethnicity or any other difference—to build simple, decent, affordable houses with those who lack adequate shelter.

Since its founding in 1976, Habitat for Humanity has built more than 200.000 houses, providing shelter for more than 100 countries around the world. A new Habitat house is completed somewhere in the world every 24 minutes.

The Rotary Club of Washago and Area were told at their first anniversary meeting that Habitat for Humanity is well on its way to building its first home in Lake Country/Orillia as Guest speaker Barry Samells, the chair of the Family Selection Committee, told them that the family has been selected, the lot in Orillia is ready to go, and the building plans are being finalized. Construction should start in May and go on through the summer.

Money is still being raised as Habitat wants to have enough funds to cover all expenses. "On this first home, we don't know for sure how many corporate sponsors will actually be there to donate the hundreds of things needed like kitchen cupboards, a bathroom, and flooring, so we want to be sure we have enough money to build the house even if the anticipated sponsors don't appear," said Samells. Rotary members were asked to use their contacts to seek out any other sponsors who could provide either materials or services to help build the home and keep costs down. "Any money we save on this home will of course be used to build the next home," he said. Habitat has been offered lots by all three townships in our area, so more houses will follow as fast as money can be raised.

The Washago Rotarians asked many questions about the mortgage cost (similar to the rent most low-income families have to pay), how the payments are kept reasonable (free labour, and a no-interest mortgage), how many families had applied (20), and how the required sweat equity hours by the selected family were being completed (mostly volunteer work with other agencies). "We are trying to build good communities, not just build houses, so we strongly encourage our families to

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volunteer with any groups they can. We hope they will become life-long volunteers," Samells said.

The Washago Rotarians expressed a strong desire to work on the house as a group for one day, and were encouraged to contact the Volunteer Committee to get on the list. Many groups may wish to participate in the construction, and will be most welcome. Any volunteers will need to spend a few hours taking a Habitat safety course before they can go onto the work site. Applying early will help Habitat schedule both work times and safety course times. Call John @ 327-1074 to get involved.



Applicants must be employed full-time in a recognized business or profession, be 25

to 40 years old, and cannot be related to a Rotarian.




