

THE TRENT-SEVERN WATERWAY

"A RESPECTABLE DITCH"

The Village of Washago has experienced some of the most fascinating years history. True to its geographic location The Village played a huge part in the the Mid-North. north end of Lake Couchiching and using various parts of the Severn River, that already was dumping into Georgian Bay, would be the most economical route, thus once again putting Washago on the map. Construction of the Trent-Severn Waterway originated with the first of numerous locks and natural waterways at Bobcaygeon in 1833, and the completion of the entire system at Lock 42, Washago, in 1920, a whopping eighty seven years later, (including being interrupted for nearly six years because of "the great war". Indeed, the Waterway is in many ways a series of quite distinct waterways, each serving local needs and each with its own history of construction. The term "A RESPECTABLE DITCH" was coined in 1988 by historian James T. Angus in a book with the same title, and many quotes throughout this submission is a credit to Mr. Angus's research, and I thank him. I encourage all interested in learning more about the history of this fascinating water-way, to get the book from your local library and read of the trials and tribulations of this amazing project accomplished by large, with man-made tools, horse and draggers and virtually millions of laborious hours, by virtually generations of laborers. History

records some families seen three generations contributing to work on this huge project. In order to put the massive project into its correct perspective, consider this! As previously mentioned, the Canal was eighty-six years in construction, (most likely the longest construction project in Canadian history), it leaves Georgian Bay and climbs to an astonishing height of eighty metres (over 260 feet) at Kirkfield, using a total of nine locks and then drops a mind-boggling 182 metres (over 591feet) as it uses another thirty-three locks and ends at Lake Ontario, an incredible 386 kilometers (over 241 miles). Is there any wonder that the entire Trent-Severn Waterway has been classified as a National Historical Site? Certainly, The Waterway was a product of a huge vision by many intelligent people, a vision expected to promote a major commercial water highway, carrying grain, timber and other freight from the interior of the continent to the shores of Lake Ontario. Although this dream never became a reality, during

the years following the War, there was an explosion of recreational boating and The Waterway suddenly achieved the importance its supporters had prophesied for it. Today tens of thousands of boats pass through its locks each summer, locks constructed by laboring men, many of them immigrants to Canada, working for a dollar a day, breaking rock and living in their draughty boarding houses. But for all intent purposes our focus will be on "LOCK 42" at Washago, as we concentrate on the projects impact, on the economy, historical and future ramifications locally. In 2002 in Ontario alone there were 'reported' 4045 victims for a loss of \$7,208,066.27 and in 2003 'reported' 6234 victims for a loss of \$12,843,700.92. Unbeknownst to their respective owners most modern automobiles (2004 and newer) on the road today are equipped with one of two forms of tire pressure monitoring systems. The objective of such is to warn the motorist of a low tire condition before a possible problem.

The NHSA (National Hiway Safety Administration) allow two forms of monitoring, active and inactive. The active system uses a transmitter mounted inside the tire as well as a receiver in the vehicle and communicates via radio frequency, not unlike your television remote. Inactive systems use the vehicles wheel speed sensors to pick up on the low tire culprate. Both systems notify the motorist with a standard corporate protocol icon on the dash of a "low tire."

Studys have shown that One in Four vehicles on the road today are running on underinflated tires. Not only a safety concern, but an increase in fuel consumption as well as premature tire wear are reason alone for such a device. An active system will notify the motorist of a 25% decrease in pressure as an inactive will notify at 30%.

Motorists should be aware as a simple tire repair or even a rotate will be subject to a recalibration in order to turn the low tire icon out. This comes with a fee. The competent service provider has had to purchase a recalibration tool and software in order to do so.

The US government has mandated every vehicle manufactured in 2007 must be equipped with such a system, so one must presume Canada will be close behind. Should you wonder if your current vehicle is equipped with such a system, stop by your local service provider and they will be happy to fill you in.

Want High Speed Internet but it's not available down your street? There is another option other than from the telephone and/or the cable companies for High speed Internet, and I'm not talking about Satellite Internet either.

I have been searching for a way to get High Speed internet to my house just south of Washago for months now, and thought I would share what I have found with my fellow residents who are searching for the same thing. It's called 'Wireless Internet'. It sends and receives the high speed internet 'signal' via radio waves off of a tower to your house. Now, before I get too far ahead of myself here, it is NOT available in this area...yet. One company I have contacted is Candlelight Broadband (http:// www.candlelight.ca/) as they service areas just a bit north and south of this area. In fact, they have a main office located in Gravenhurst. In my discussions with them, I have found that if enough people wanted high speed Internet in this area, they would consider putting in the necessary equipment (Tower to broadcast the signal etc...) to provide us with FAST (way faster than dial-up) Internet access. All they need to know is who wants it, where you live so they can determine the best area to locate their tower, and enough households interested in signing up, which isn't as many as you might think!

So if you want High Speed Internet at a reasonable cost

(monthly charges are similar to regular High Speed access), please visit their Website (http://www.candlelight.ca/) for more information, and put in your request for service. Who knows? If enough people are interested, High speed access can be a reality to the areas of Washago that are not serviced by the Telephone/Cable companies.

One note: I am in no way affiliated with Candlelight Broadband in any way. I'm just a rural resident tired of being ignored by the Telephone and Cable companies.

Some of the warning signs that you are not the driver you once were are people honking at you, difficulty seeing at night, your range of motion is less, trouble reading signs, help offered from passengers, slow or poor decisions, getting lost in familiar surroundings, lane drifting, stopping for a green light or running stop signs or red lights, mixing peddles, overwhelmed in busy areas, your children don't want to drive with you, collisions, if many of these are true, get an evaluation, or if you know someone like this suggest they be checked by a physician. Men tend to outlive their driving ability by 6 years, women 10. The session ended with many, many questions.

It is very important you get advise about your wishes concerning loans to beneficiaries, eq. is the loan forgiven or is it to be taken from their share? RRSPs and RRIFs are subject to 46% income tax when you pass on, these taxes are paid by the Estate not the recipient. You cannot legally disinherit a dependent child, all other children, ves. Your dependant child is receiving government benefits that could be terminated should they receive a bequest, a Hansen Trust is the answer to the problem. You want your beguest protected from your child's spouse, the funds should be put into a separate bank account and not used in anything jointly owned or ask them to enter into a marriage contract. Take the time to pick a person you trust in regards to your Powers of Attorney as it is in effect the day it is signed, not when you become incapable. You and your spouse should have Powers of Attorney for Property regardless of whether all of your assets are owned jointly as the Government will take control as soon as one of you becomes incapacitated. Many questions were asked after the presentation, one of which concerned Title Fraud, title insurance was a partial solution to this problem.



1 Cup flour

1/4 cup sugar

½ cup butter

1 egg yolk

½ tsp vanilla

CHEESE MIXTURE:

1 ½ lbs (3 pkgs.) cream cheese

at room temp

1 cup sugar 1 1/2 tbsp flour

1/4 tsp salt

½ tsp vanilla

4 eggs

1/4 cup whipping cream

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven: Crust 400, Cake 350. Prepare crust: Combine flour and sugar. Cut in butter with pastry blender until mixture is crumbly. Add beaten egg yolk and vanilla and stir well with fingers. Using 1/3 of mixture line bottom of spring form pan, (remove sides) Bake in a hot oven until golden brown. Butter sides of pan & assemble mould. Using balance of mixture line sides of pan.

Prepare cheese filling: Using electric mixer, cream cheese well. Add sugar, flour, salt, and vanilla. Beat at medium speed until well blended. Add eggs one at a time beating well after each addition. Fold in cream. Beat in melted chocolate. Pour into crust and bake in moderate oven until centre is cooked. Remove from oven and cool on rack. Remove side of pan and chill over night. Top with cherry pie filling (in centre) and whipped cream around edge. This is a nice Christmas recipe. Joanne Barton

Curb Appeal

One thing commonly overlooked when selling a home is curb appeal. It is the first impression of your property and will probably be a lasting one. We are truly blessed to live here in the Washago area where there is an abundance of natural materials to decorate your home for the holidays. Take a walk, carry a large bag and a pruning shears. Look for the bright orange-red winterberries commonly found in low-lying areas and roadsides. Sumac berries bring a lovely burgundy colour to exterior planters, wreaths and garlands The Sumac common to our area is the Staghorn Sumac (rhus typhina). This is not the poisonous variety. It is easily identifiable by the velvet textured branches and berry heads. Hydrangeas or snowball flower heads make a nice addition to wreaths and garlands. Hang flower heads in a dry place for a few weeks. These can be spray painted any colour with florist paint. Evergreens are plentiful for making garlands. To make a garland you require several evergreen boughs, twine the length of the desired garland, green florist wire, found at craft stores and wire cutters. Lay the evergreen boughs in one di-

rection on the twin and wrap securely with florist wire. Continue overlapping to the desired length and fullness. Add colourful berries, sumac or hydrangeas for colour. Voila! Make your first impression memorable!
