fact that there is more of a demand for oil than can be produced. This is what we are being told, and if this is true, there are many practical ways to lower gas prices. Improving the automobile efficiency by just three miles a gallon would conserve more than 1 million barrels of oil each day. If gas efficiency makes such a huge difference, we could all do our part and buy smaller cars. (Mine would have to be the first to go!)

Unfortunately, in our society most of what we hear through government controlled media outlets is not necessarily the truth, but only what they want us to hear, and since the largest publicly-traded oil producer and distributor in the world had an operating profit of \$36.13 billion in 2005 (an all-time record for any publicly-traded company) I think it's safe to say that no matter what the reason, the prices are way too high!! By now you're probably thinking gasoline priced at about \$.80 is super cheap. Me too! It is currently between \$1.05 and \$1.10 depending on where you are (or how far you can afford to travel) for regular unleaded.

Now that the oil companies have conditioned us to think that the cost

homes. Or it could just be the simple of a liter of gas is CHEAP at \$.90 -\$1.00, we need to take some intelligent, united action, to teach them that BUYERS control the marketplace..... not sellers.

Phillip Hollsworth offered this good idea.

With the price of gasoline going up more each day, we consumers need to take action. The only way we are going to see the price of gas come down is if we hit someone in the pocketbook by not purchasing their gas! And, we can do that WITHOUT hurting ourselves. How? Since we all rely on our cars, we can't just stop buying gas. But we CAN have an impact on gas prices if we all act together to force a price war.

Here's the idea:

Don't purchase gasoline from the leading gas companies. Go to the little guys instead. The no name gas bars. If the large companies aren't selling any gas, they will be inclined to reduce their prices. If they reduce their prices, the other companies will have to follow suit.

This is something that everyone can do, without even suffering any consequences! Something needs to be done, and this sounds to me like an excellent place to start the resistance.

The Ministers Message

"Sad to say, death has had another good year." So says Peter Short, Moderator of the United Church of Canada. Peter made this statement in his annual Easter reflection printed in the last issue of the Observer, which is the United Church magazine. You know right away what he means. You think of our troops serving in Afghanistan, and you remember that the last soldier to be killed (as of this writing) was a private, a young father just 22 years old. Death has had a good year in Iraq too, and in Israel and Palestine, and in the Sudan. Death has had a good year in Ontario. The murders that have made the headlines the past few weeks alone are horrific. And of course, our congregations, our families, our friends and neighbours have all been touched by the loss of precious loved ones.

As I meet with families in preparation for a funeral, the question that I have noticed more and more being put to me is, how can you be sure there is something more, after death? How do you *know* there is a "heaven" or an afterlife?

In response, one could point to the near-death experiences that so many people have described. If you've read any of the popular books on the subject you know people speak of seeing a brilliant yet warm white light, of traveling at great speed down a tunnel, of feeling a deep sense of peace and a total absence of fear. Of course, that's not really proof, because those people didn't, in fact, die. Another approach would be to talk about all the people you know who have lost a loved one to death, and yet have felt in some profound way the very real and comforting presence of that loved one close by, after they have died. But that too does not really answer the question.


For what these folk are really asking is, how do you account for the hope that is in you? What is that? Where does it come from? The assurance people want is the assurance that comes to us from faith - in our case, faith in Jesus Christ. The resurrection is the answer. The resurrection is God's response to that question.

And if you say, where is the evidence that the resurrection really happened? Look no farther than the very existence of the church. Two thousand years ago, after Jesus' crucifixion, his disciples were huddled together in a locked room, afraid to go out for fear they would come to the same end as Jesus. But something happened! Something happened that transformed them from fearful, grief-stricken disciples who thought they had been abandoned, into joyful, confident, courageous apostles, who boldly told one and all what they now knew, because they had experienced it. 


